About Pathfinders

The Pathfinder Club is a worldwide organization sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Nearly 2 million young people in grades 5 to 10 are members. The club is open to all youth in those grades who are willing to live by the pledge and law.

Leadership

All Pathfinder leaders are Christians. By their teaching and example, they show what it means to be a vibrant follower of Jesus Christ. They consider the Pathfinder Club a place where growth and learning are synonymous with fun.

Organizational Structure

Pathfinder clubs are made up of one or more units. A unit contains 5-7 boys or girls and a minimum of one counselor. Each unit member is assigned specific tasks, such as being captain or scribe. Units normally participate with other units in group activities, though each unit is allowed to individually pursue activities. By working together, Pathfinders develop leadership and teamwork skills.

Club Activities

Pathfinder club activities range from community service and mission projects to outdoor activities such as backpacking and camping. Clubs often plan trips to national parks, nature centers, museums, businesses, health and social welfare facilities, and other places of local or historical interest.

Community Involvement

Pathfinders serve their communities by collecting food, clothing, and money for distribution to those in need. They participate in service projects through church and local organizations. They also reach out to their community through creative club based initiatives from storm clean up to health fairs and homeless services to providing care baskets.

Training

Pathfindering is built on a curriculum with six levels of learning: Friend, Companion, Explorer, Ranger, Voyager, and Guide. Leaders provide instruction in nearly 350 areas covering arts and crafts, aquatics, nature, household arts, recreation, spiritual development, health, and vocational training. Pathfinders receive recognition as they complete honors and curriculum levels.
